Commentary on Today's Gospel Reading

It is said that God will give the most loving answer possible to our prayers. Sometimes that means that God will physically heal us or grant us some favor. At other times it means that God will meet us on the cross. We would naturally prefer to receive a positive response to our prayers, but God, who sees reality from a different perspective, can see that it is sometimes better if we do not receive the things for which we prayed. God thinks in terms of a long-term good, eternal good, and not short-term apparent good.

"... For everyone who ask, receives; and the one who seeks, finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened...If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?" Luke 11: 10, 13

Teach Us To Pray

In today's Gospel Reading, the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray. If we look throughout the gospels, we find accounts of Jesus praying in any number of circumstances or situations. Jesus prays prayers of blessing and benediction. Jesus prays prayers of gratitude and thanksgiving. Jesus prays communally and privately. With this, the Lord's prayer is part of Jesus' teaching to his followers to pray in the everyday events of their lives.

The Lord's Prayer is the prayer par excellence in the sense that it not only affirms ultimate dependence on God, but it also insists that we, as the people of God, must be invested in our prayer. Jesus says, "Forgive us our sins we ourselves forgive everyone in debt to us," and then he continues to share the story of the friend who asks for bread. Pope Francis attested, "You pray for the hungry. Then you feed them. That's how prayer works." Prayer is a way of living in relationship with God and others. When we pray, then, we unite heaven with earth.

The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church

THE GIFT

8. At the Mass of the Lord's Supper celebrated on Holy Thursday, the priest prays these words:

For he is the true and eternal Priest, who instituted the pattern of an everlasting sacrifice and was the first to offer himself as the saving Victim, commanding us to make this offering as his memorial.



As we eat his flesh that was sacrificed for us, we are made strong, and, as we drink his Blood that was poured out for us, we are washed clean.

The words of the liturgy on the night the Church commemorates the institution of the Eucharist speak to us of the Mass as the re-presentation of Christ's unique sacrifice on the Cross, the reception of Christ truly present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and the marvelous effects of communion in those who receive this gift. 9. The mission of the Lord's entire life on earth was to glorify the Father by bringing us salvation. In the Nicene Creed recited at Mass, we profess "For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man." The salvation offered in the Life, Death, and Resurrection of Christ is nothing less than sharing in the very life of God, in the communion of love among the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. There is no greater gift that God could possibly give us. In Christ, we are sharers in the divine nature. The Church Fathers referred to this participation in the divine life as "divinization." The eternal Son of God made this possible by becoming man and uniting humanity to his divine Person. St. Augustine explained, "the maker of man was made man, so that man might be a receiver of God." In fact, Pope Francis reminds us that "in the bread of the Eucharist, 'creation is projected towards divinization, towards the holy wedding feast, towards unification with the Creator himself."
