ABOUT THE LITURGY:

Built of Living Stones – Parables & Art

As we conclude our looking at Built of Living Stones, it might be helpful to understand the document in the light of that great teaching method which Jesus uses in the gospels: parables. It is tempting to try to explain parables, laying out exactly what each character or each moment represents. Parables, however, are not allegory. There is no true one-to-one explanation. Instead, parables speak to us on the level of symbol, leaving a lot of interpretations to the listener, the viewer, the receiver.

In the parable of the Prodigal Son, for example, it is tempting to declare this person, or that one, to be God. But it is better for us to try our fine ourselves in each component of this story. What understandings are gained if we consider ourselves in any role: as the father, the wayward son, the loyal son, or one of the guests at the party? In effect, a parable is a room with many doors, each one a portal to somewhere unknown, and perhaps a deeper understanding.

In the same way, liturgical art demands the attention and interpretation of the receiver. "In the Christian community's place of prayer, art evokes and glorifies the 'transcendent mystery of God – the surpassing invisible beauty of truth and love visible in Christ" (BLS 142). That transcendent mystery demands that artists not be too explicit: "A truly worthy and beautiful artwork can transform the artist and the community for which it is intended. The dialogue with God that an artwork mediates can persuade and invite; however, it does not force its meanings upon individuals or communities" (BLS 151).

The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church

C) Communion with **Christ and the Church**

26. We are first incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church, through the waters of Baptism. Yet Baptism, like the other sacraments, is ordered toward Eucharistic communion. The Second Vatican Council teaches:

The other sacraments, as well as with every ministry of the Church and eve-

ry work of the apostolate, are tied together with the Eucharist and are directed toward it. The Most Blessed Eucharist contains the entire spiritual boon of the Church, that is, Christ himself, our Pasch and Living Bread, by the action of the Holy Spirit through his very flesh vital and vitalizing, giving life to men who are thus invited and encouraged to offer themselves, their labors and all created things, together with him.

The Council Fathers continue,

In this light, the Eucharist shows itself as the source and the apex of the whole work of preaching the Gospel. Those under instruction are introduced by stages to a sharing in the Eucharist, and the faithful, already marked with the seal of Baptism and Confirmation, are through the reception of the Eucharist fully joined to the Body of Christ.

That is why the Council calls the eucharistic sacrifice "the source and summit of the Christian life."

27. St. Paul emphasizes that this communion exists not only among ourselves but also with those who came before us. In addressing the Church at Corinth, he praises them for holding fast to the traditions, just as I handed them on to you (1 Cor 11:2). Later, he highlights the Eucharist as a sacred tradition handed on by Christ to the Apostles, and in which we now share: For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you (1 Cor 11:23). During every Mass we are united with all the holy men and women, the saints, who have preceded us.
