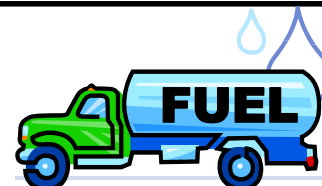

ABOUT THE LITURGY: True Colors, Part 2

Last week we, looked at the color white as it is used by the Church to celebrate the new life of the resurrection. Now let us consider some other colors in the liturgy.

The theological virtue of hope is symbolized by the color Green, just as the burning fire of love is symbolized by Red. Green is the color of growing things, and hope, like them, is always new and always fresh. Liturgically, green is the color of Ordinary Time, the orderly sequence of weeks through the year, a season in which we are being neither single-mindedly penitent (in purple) nor overwhelmingly joyful (in white). Red is the color of fire and of blood. Liturgically, it is used to celebrate the fire of the Holy Spirit (for instance, at Pentecost) and the blood of the martyrs.

Violet is a dark color, 'the gloomy cast of the mortified, denoting affliction and melancholy'. Liturgically, it is the color of Advent and Lent, the seasons of penance and preparation. Along with Black, the color of mourning, both Violet and Black can be used in Masses for the Dead and, in particular, on All Souls' Day.

Finally, the General Instruction on the Roman Missal, the basic guide for our liturgical practices, states, "The colors gold or silver may be worn on more solemn occasions in the Dioceses of the United States of America" (346). In practice, gold and silver have become a sort of "super-white," worn for Christmas, Easter, or a local patronal feast.

II. OUR RESPONSE

33. Our gratitude is also expressed in our worship of the Blessed Sacrament outside of Mass. These forms of worship are all intrinsically related to the Eucharistic celebration.

In the Eucharist, the Son of God comes to meet us and desires to become one with us; eucharistic adoration is simply the natural consequence of the eucharistic celebration. Receiving the Eucharist means adoring him whom we receive. Only in this way do we become one with him, and are given, as it were, a foretaste of the beauty of the heavenly liturgy.

We rejoice in the growing numbers of the faithful who pray in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, a testament of faith in the Real Presence of the Lord in the Eucharist. We encourage this devotion, which helps all of us to be formed by the self-giving love we behold in the Lord's gift of himself in the Eucharist. St. (Mother) Teresa of Calcutta reportedly once said: "When you look at the crucifix, you understand how much Jesus loved you then. When you look at the Sacred Host, you understand how much Jesus loves you now."
