ABOUT THE LITURGY: Saint Joseph and Hope

For the Northern Hemisphere, this week bears the darkest days as the earth approaches the winter solstice. Yet hope lies between these days of much darkness and little light, of a busy time and silent reflection. Our Advent waiting gradually brightens, much like the Fourth candle in the wreath illumines hope for the journey ahead. The Northern Hemisphere will turn back towards the Sun. God's movement in our lives will never cease.

The Angel in Matthew's gospel today appears to Joseph with such mystery and movement. God's love manifested in Joseph embodies the faithful action and a close accompaniment with Mary and the Baby growing inside her. Joseph's example teaches us to balance the exterior world with inner light, both in big and small ways.

From the ancient church the "O" Antiphons of Advent offer an additional perspective and illuminate a way of renewal that leads on to Bethlehem: O Wisdom, O Lord f the House of Israel, O Root of Jesse's Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, and O Emmanuel.

II. OUR RESPONSE **B.** Conversion

50. Before we receive Holy Communion, we should make a good examination of conscience to ensure that we are properly disposed to receive the Body and Blood of the Lamb. If we find that we have broken communion with



Christ and his Church, we are not properly disposed to receive the Eucharist. However, we should not despair since the Lord in his mercy has given us a remedy. He loves us and deeply desires to forgive us and to restore our communion with him. On the first Easter night, the Risen Jesus gave to the Apostles and their successors the power to forgive sins and to reconcile sinners with the Church. He gave the Church the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation when he breathed on the Apostles and said to them: Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained. Whenever we sin, we have this beautiful opportunity to be renewed and strengthened by God's grace. If we have sinned gravely, the sacrament provides us with the opportunity to recover the gift of sanctifying grace and to be restored to full communion with God and the Church. All the sacrament requires of us as penitents is that we have contrition for our sins, resolve not to sin again, confess our sins, receive sacramental absolution and do the assigned penance. We encourage all Catholics to a renewed appreciation for this wonderful sacrament in which we receive the Lord's pardon and peace. In the words of Pope Francis, we say to all Catholics in our country: "Don't be afraid to go the Sacrament of Confession, where you will meet Jesus who forgives you."
