

Today's Scripture Readings 3RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Isaiah 8:23-9:3 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 Matthew 4:12-23

About the Liturgy: Word of God Sunday

In his 2019 Apostolic Letter, Apertuit Illis - He opened for them – (AI), Pope Francis established that this, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, would be devoted to the celebration, study, and dissemination of the Word of God. This year it falls within the Week of Praver for Christian Unity. Considering today's scripture, we see how discipleship of Christ leads to an active belonging in the Church. Pope Francis explains that this celebration has "ecumenical value" and that the Scriptures lead listeners and believers "to authentic and firm unity" (AI 3). In his letter, Pope Francis refers to table fellowship in the Emmaus journey story and the "unbreakable bond between sacred scripture and the Eucharist," in which from the one table, both the Word of God and the Body of Christ equally enables us to see ourselves "as part of

one another" (AI 8). Both work within us to transform our lives and our very selves.

Pope Francis insists that God's Word "has the power to open our eyes and to enable us to renounce a stifling and barren individualism and instead to embark on a new path of sharing and solidarity" (AI 13). We are called to be faithful disciples who live by sharing mercy and love each day, who study Sacred Scripture with open eyes, and who participate in the Eucharist with open hearts.



Please make a point to the sacred art display in the Church Gathering Area that is an example of Visio Divina. Visio Divina — "sacred seeing" — is an ancient form of Christian prayer in which we allow our hearts and imaginations to enter into a sacred image, in

silence, to see what God might have to say to us.

The display changes weekly to correspond with Scriptures from the weekend Masses. Ted Wall is responsible for this new addition to our sanctuary. He researches the content of the Scriptures and finds corresponding artwork by well-known and sometimes obscure artists who have created a masterpiece that lends itself to this ancient form of praver. Copies of a more in-depth description of Visio Divina are available at the display site.

The art display is one of the offerings of our new Arts Ministry. The next gathering of the Ministry is Saturday, February 18 from 1:00-3:00 PM in the Center Lower Level. A light meal will be served. All are welcome to attend! Questions? See Ted Wall after Mass, or call him at 914-329-3518.

II. OUR RESPONSE SENT FORTH
